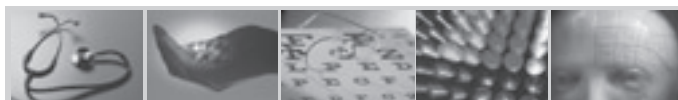

The OHEP Center for Medical Education (OHEP) was incorporated in 1974 as the “Oakland Health Education Program” based in Oakland County, Michigan. OHEP has grown into a southeastern Michigan regional consortium with a primary mission to deliver quality health care through excellence in graduate medical education (GME). OHEP is now the largest community-based GME consortium in the United States. Consortium members are Wayne State University School of Medicine, Oakland University, the University of Michigan, the Detroit Medical Center, and eight community-based teaching hospitals. The member hospitals have over 6,900 beds, and 265 accredited residency and fellowship programs in 81 specialties that are led by 3,842 university and community faculty.

OHEP stimulates educational innovation, cooperation, and sharing of knowledge and experience among its member institutions to achieve educational benefits that no single institution can obtain alone. In addition to its annual Research Workshop Series, OHEP provides many GME programs: the Great Lakes State Family Practice Review; Advanced Life Support in Obstetrics Course; Intensive Internal Medicine Review; Surgery Basic Science Course; Postgraduate Course in Obstetrics and Gynecology (Ob/Gyn); Fetal Assessment Course; Laser Surgery Course; Temporal Bone Surgical Dissection Course; oral examinations in surgery and Ob/Gyn; and faculty development and educational technology courses.

In 2002, **Joseph Brocato, PhD** was appointed Executive Director of OHEP, and Assistant Dean for Community Education in the WSU School of Medicine. The DFM welcomes Dr. Brocato and collaborations with our OHEP affiliates.

Practice-based Research

The Division of Practice-based Research is the newest division within the WSU Department of Family Medicine, having started just 3 short years ago. The three faculty members of the Division are: **Kendra Schwartz, MD, MSPH, Victoria Neale, PhD, MPH, and Jinping Xu, MD**, and our three research assistants are: **Joseph Monsur, BS, Jay Northrup, MPT and Rhonda Dailey, MD**. **Rebecca Dorn** provides administrative assistance.

Many of the Division's 2002 activities were focused on obtaining external funding. We have been quite successful. We received funding from the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan Foundation for a study of the use of lipid-lowering medication in an urban family practice center, which is well under way. This two-year study will determine the prevalence of use of statin-type medications in clinical practice and the barriers and benefits to use as perceived by both patients and physicians.

From the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services/Health Resource Services administration, we received funding to continue to build our nascent practice-based research network, **MetroNet**. The network was created in 2001 and currently consists of 15 very committed physicians who are interested in research that matters to their patients. New physician and practice members are welcome.

We are currently conducting a survey study of patients' use of the internet for health information as MetroNet's first collaborative group project. The federal Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) is also providing grant support for us to assess and improve the electronic communication capabilities of MetroNet members. With this funding we will develop an interactive website.

In addition to these three grants funded in 2002, we have other grant proposals under review at various national and local agencies. We also submitted three manuscripts for publication, describing practice-based research studies that were conducted over the last two years. A report of our study of the use of online databases for answering clinical questions at the point of care will be published in *Family Medicine* in 2003.

The Practice-based Research Division is committed to working with the OHEP-affiliated family practice residency programs to build **MetroNet** and expand the field of practice-based research in the richly diverse metropolitan Detroit area. It is only through practice-based research and the cooperation of many primary care physicians that we can begin to answer clinical questions that arise from our unique population. 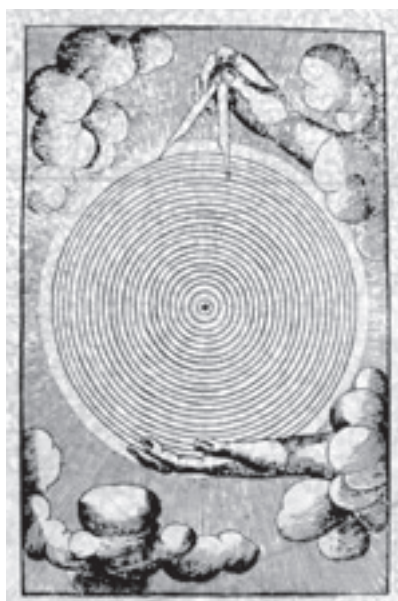

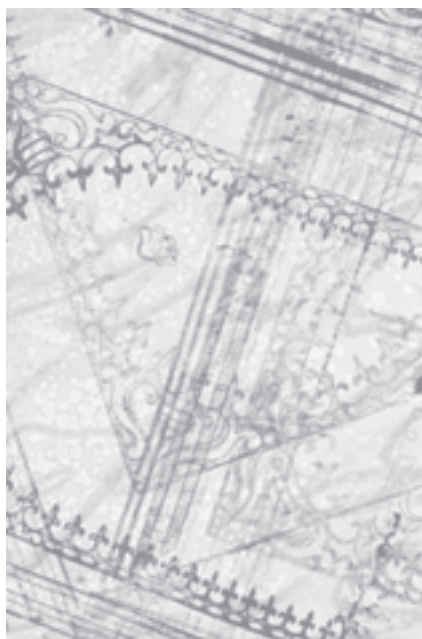

Champions Project

In 2002, our departmental faculty development program (the Champions Project) focused on clinic site-based projects with clinical faculty. **Linda Roth, PhD**, provides overall direction to our innovative and nationally-recognized approach to faculty development. The "Champions Project" team appreciates the support of **Patrick Bridge, PhD**, evaluator, **Diane Moorman, PhD**, research assistant, and **Ms. Juatane Miller**, secretary.

Faculty "champions" for each of the five project domains developed synergistic activities that involved two or more of these areas of emphasis: Patient-centered Clinical Method (**John Porcerelli, PhD** and **Fred Rosin, MD**); Evidence-based Clinical Practice (**Kendra Schwartz, MD**); Practice-based Research (**Victoria Neale, PhD**); Professional and Academic Activities (**Maryjean Schenk, MD**); and Leadership and Organizational Skills (**Sander Kushner, DO**). Patient-Centered Clinical Method

At the predoctoral level, we integrated the PCCM model into large group clinical medicine didactics and small-group problem-based learning. Large PCCM posters are displayed in each DFM conference room, at every DFM precepting station, and in our predoctoral student area. At the GME level, we integrated PCCM into resident didactics. We modified our behavioral science videotape evaluation system to collect baseline PCCM measures in all residents. Finally, our clinical operations team incorporated PCCM in our patient satisfaction survey.

Evidence-based Clinical Practice (EBCP) & Practice-based Research (PBR)

At our Detroit family practice center, we emphasized the following EBCP competencies: recognizing clinical questions; formulating searchable questions; finding patient-oriented evidence using computer-based tools; critically appraising evidence; and applying evidence in practice. Combining the EBCP domain with the Practice-based Research domain, clinical faculty designed a prospective study in which physicians recorded their clinical questions and their search results. Physicians reported that 62% of the obtained answers modified their opinion; 56% of the time the answers influenced the care of the current patient; and would affect the care of future patients 70% of the time.

Professional and Academic Skills

The EBCP/PBR study was an experiential learning activity in which clinician faculty were first-time co-investigators. In collaboration with PBR division members, Detroit clinical faculty wrote a manuscript that is now "in press" at *Family Medicine*. The study was also presented at the 2002 Annual Meeting of the Society of Teachers of Family Medicine.

Leadership and Organizational Skills

Our Royal Oak practice site was the setting for the development of Leadership and Organizational Skills. The clinic team focused on collaboration and being an effective team member. We applied the Institute for Healthcare Improvement principles, "Pursuit of Perfection in Health Care". In January, 2002, the practice changed to an "open access" system, and site faculty development meetings were devoted to processing this change, which is having a positive effect on numbers of patient visits.

Benjamin J. Hodgkins, Ph.D.

Benjamin Hodgkins, PhD came to the Department of Family Medicine (DFM) in the mid-1980s to serve as faculty for the geriatrics fellowship program developed by Dr. Hess, then chairman of the Department.

During his tenure in the department, Dr. Hodgkins contributed to many grant applications, seeking external funding for the department's service, teaching and research programs. His was the first draft of the State of Michigan grant that brought \$1.5 million to create educational programming around managed care and community medicine. Ben was a key individual in the yearlong effort that occurred in the Cass Corridor, leading to the design and implementation of a new family practice center in the Cass Corridor. This, in turn, became a teaching site for an expanded FP residency program.

Ben had an abiding faith in human beings. His patience and gentle coaching helped countless faculty members and residents think through, work around or directly confront challenges that seemed to block their ways. His unflappable optimism and deep insight about persons and personalities made him the "grout" that held together many of the "blocks" that built the Department.

Ben's greatest gift was one-on-one teaching with residents, students and graduate students, guiding their thinking and activities in research. Ben's "students" demonstrated scholarship through rigorous studies and publications, some of which Ben joined as author. Many demonstrated scholarly rigor in thinking and applying the literature. Ben was especially strong in this latter area, modeling it for junior faculty and learners. He used data and literature searches and scholarly thinking to refine ideas and develop critical thinking skills in those he mentored.

Ben died peacefully on December 28, 2002 while visiting family in Duluth. Ben was buried in Arlington National Cemetery, in recognition of his service in the Korean War. A piper, clad in tartan, led the procession in and out of the church at his memorial service. It was a celebration of a well-rounded life well completed.

The Family Medicine Residency Program is a fully-accredited residency with traditions in medical education. Established in 1974, the program has graduated 197 family physicians and is responsible for training almost one third of the family physicians on staff at Detroit Medical Center. The residency training program is the key component to the department goal of preparing family physicians for practice in the 21st century. The outstanding faculty and residents are a dynamic group of individuals committed to improving the health and well being of patients. There are abundant opportunities for the committed and inquisitive resident learner.

Competency Based Education

In 2001 Residency Program Director **Dr. Tsveti Markova** worked with faculty to enhance the curriculum by developing new innovative methods of implementing competency-based education in family medicine, and providing measurable outcomes of learning. Residents are taught principles of professionalism, ethics and communication skills through the Patient-Centered Clinical Method. Evaluation of their strengths and areas needing improvement are accomplished through the use of videotaping, structured clinical exams with standardized patients, web-based educational modules and other innovative assessment tools.

The residency program continues to provide a strong didactic curriculum, coordinated by **Dr. Nejla Israel**, and focused on problem-based learning, case presentations, interactive discussions and workshops. **Dr. Harsha Jayatilake** assumed the responsibility of reorganizing and managing the longitudinal curricular experiences. They are taught throughout the three years of residency and are uniquely

suitable to the future practice of primary care physicians. Longitudinal training includes various core educational experiences such as research, evidence-based medicine, community medicine, sports medicine, and geriatrics.

In 2002, we implemented a night float system in the adult medicine inpatient service. This system greatly reduced the overall number of calls per resident and improved the overall well-being of residents.

Distance Learning

Dr. Markova is one of the pioneers of distance learning in the School of Medicine. As stated in an article in *Wayne Medicine 2002*, "Web conferencing joins family medicine residents, despite location". PowerPoint presentations are transmitted by internet to connect the two main hospital sites allowing more interaction between residents and faculty and minimizing commuting time. Dr. Markova is interested in comparing the effectiveness of e-conferencing to traditional classroom teaching.

Division of Behavioral Science

An integral aspect of family practice residency training involves the development of a knowledge base and clinical skills in psychosocial assessment and interventions. Recent studies indicate that a large percentage of patients utilizing primary care services suffer from a variety of psychological and psychiatric conditions, especially depressive and anxiety disorders. Traditional medical education has lacked comprehensive training in psychosocial aspects of patient care. The Division of Behavioral Science provides knowledge and skill development in a patient-

centered approach. This method ensures the integration of tradition medical training with the socio-emotional needs of patients. The division's competency-based curriculum provides training in the assessment and management of the most prevalent psychiatric conditions common to primary care practice. Collaborative efforts with the Department of Behavioral Neurosciences and Psychiatry faculty at WSU ensures the highest quality training in the knowledge and skill acquisition of psychiatric symptoms and their management. Knowledge of community resources is an essential piece of the curriculum providing efficient referrals for the more complicated psychiatric disorders and social needs. Educational interventions include weekly lectures, review of videotaped patient encounters, and a 2-week rotation with the consultation-liaison psychiatry service at Sinai-Grace Hospital.

The members of the division have had extensive clinical training and experience in such areas as individual, couple, family, and group psychotherapy. Members provide teaching and curricular expertise to medical students, residents and faculty in human sexuality, psychiatry, geriatrics, psychological assessment, ethical and legal aspects of medicine, domestic violence, end-of-life care, patient-centered medicine, child, adolescent, adult development and psychopathology, and substance abuse.

In addition, division faculty provide supervision and consultation for resident research projects.

Division Members

Juliann Binienda, MA, LMFT is a Lecturer in Family Medicine and a licensed marriage and family therapist. She coordinates the family medicine clerkship hospice site visit and debriefing experience. Her interest in medical student education and development also involves her providing numerous presentations to medical students on screening for domestic and elder abuse in primary care, anxiety and depression and human sexuality. Within the family practice residency, she provides clinical consultation to residents and directs the Community Medicine curriculum.

John Porcerelli, PhD, ABPP is an Associate Professor of Family Medicine, Director of the Division of Behavioral Science, a licensed psychologist, a Fellow of the American Academy of Clinical Psychology, and Diplomate (Clinical Psychology) of the American Board of Professional Psychology. He is also a Consulting Editor of the *Journal of Personality Assessment* and a reviewer for several journals in psychology, psychiatry, and medicine. Dr. Porcerelli recently completed a pilot project on the development of a personality profile of partner-violent men and is seeking funding for a large-scale project through the National Institutes of Mental Health. He is also co-investigator of a psychotherapy outcome study through Yale University Department of Psychiatry.

Merton Shill, JD, PhD, LLM is a Clinical Associate Professor directs the medical ethics and resident well-being curricula, and conducts the psychosocial case conference as part of the residency behavioral science didactics. In addition to his training in child, adolescent, and adult psychology, Dr. Shill earned a Juris Doctorate and Masters of Law. Within the family practice residency. Dr. Shill's research interests include ADHD, the role of alexithymia and psychological mindedness on physical health, and the difficult doctor-patient relationship.

Division of Medical Education

With the leadership of **Richard Gallagher, PhD**, the Division of Medical Education (DME) brings professional expertise in teaching and learning to developing, implementing and evaluating of state-of-the-art medical curricula and training programs in collaboration with DFM and other School of Medicine faculty. An active program of faculty development is maintained under the direction of **Dr. Linda Roth**.

The DME contributes to the national medical education literature, provides leadership in national organizations, and supports its innovative educational projects with competitively-awarded external grants.

DME members continue to provide curricular development, implementation and program evaluation support to the Office of the Associate Dean for Academic and Student Affairs through the work of **Drs. Sharon Popp** and **Patrick Bridge** and supported by **Lisa Blackwell**.

Innovative Predoctoral Curriculum

This year, DFM faculty have been in the forefront of contributing to the design and implementation of one of the most educationally exciting and challenging curricular projects undertaken at Wayne State University School of Medicine in recent years. The Clinical Medicine course is a newly-organized course which is built upon the legacy of the highly successful Introduction To The Patient course administered by the Department of Family Medicine for more than a decade. The course directors for this multi-disciplinary effort are **Tom Roe, MD** of the Department of Family Medicine and **Mike Stellini, MD** of the Department of Internal Medicine. Also from the Department of Family Medicine, **Sharon Popp, PhD** is the Medical Educator for the course. **Ms. Sharon Taylor** of the medical school Office of Academic and Student Programs is the Course Coordinator.

The purpose of the Clinical Medicine course is to introduce the first year Wayne State University students to the knowledge, skills, and attitudes needed in clinical practice. Clinical Medicine differs from most other courses taught during the first two years of medical school because: 1) It is case-based, 2) A significant portion of the course takes place in small groups, 3) It simulates the clinical learning

environment with peer-based team learning facilitated by an experienced clinician and 4) It is a collaborative course supported by **Robert R. Frank, MD** Associate Dean for Academic and Student Programs and includes participation by the departments of Community Medicine, Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, and Pediatrics. It is taught by University faculty and Community physicians. OHEP Teaching Hospitals that have contributed faculty to the course this year include **Bon Secours Hospital, Henry Ford Hospital, Oakwood Hospital, Providence Hospital, St. John Hospital, and William Beaumont Hospital**.

Clinical Medicine consists of several units in Year 1 and Year 2 and will extend through Year 4 as the course develops. It includes small group sessions (10-12 students with one physician facilitator), large group activities, web-based instruction, and site visits to the office of a primary care physician, as well as other learning experiences. Many of the small group instructors have taught in the Introduction to the Patient course and include **Drs. Thomas Anan, Joel Appel, Peter Coggan, Bruce Deschere, Kenneth Ginsburg, Harsha Jayatilake, Gary Otsuji, Mark Paschall, Silas Norman, Jaclyn Randel, Dave Rodgers, Thomas Roe, Edward Rose, Fred Rosin, Maryjean Schenk, Maria Shreve, Michael Stellini, Scott Yaekle, and Ernie Yoder**. In addition, several physicians are new to the course this year: **Drs. Robert Frank, Tim Lamb, Diane Levine, Tsveti Markova, Kathy Ling-McGeorge, Howard Schubiner and Kim Yu**.

In the small group sessions, students have the opportunity to interact with and interview standardized patients trained by the School of Medicine to portray patients presenting with a variety of medical issues. Faculty members from the Department of Family Medicine and the Division of Occupational and Environmental Medicine providing instruction in the course include **Dr. Maryjean Schenk, Dr. Bruce Deschere, Dr. Harsha Jayatilake, Dr. Tsveti Markova, Dr. Frederick Rosin, Dr. Kendra Schwartz, and Dr. Cathy Simpson**. The course has been well received by both students and faculty since its launch in September of 2002.

Division Occupational and Environmental Medicine

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*The Mission of the WSU DFM Division Occupational and Environmental Medicine
Mission is to protect, restore, and enhance the health of those we serve with an emphasis on the occupational community.*

What are our nation's greatest health risks? Cancer? Diabetes? Heart disease? If asked to list America's greatest public-health concerns, few of us would be likely to include work-related illness and injury near the top of the list. According to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), an average of 9,000 U.S. workers sustain disabling injuries on the job each day. Another 16 workers die each day from an injury sustained at work while 137 more die from work-related diseases.

Occupational Medicine is a specialty that seeks to understand the relationship between the environment and health. While its principal focus is on the workplace, consideration is also given to the global environment. The goal is not only to understand and control factors that may interfere with health, but also to promote healthy living and improve quality of life. In short "our job is to make sure that your job does not make you sick". The training emphasizes the study of populations, figuring out the agents responsible for illness (causality), and determining if something will happen once an individual is exposed (risk assessment).

There have been many changes to the WSU DFM Division of Occupational & Environmental Medicine over the past year. **Alain Couturier, MD**, was responsible for clinical operations and served a brief stint as the Residency Director. He returned to Indiana as an occupational health consultant. While saddened by his departure, we are pleased at the addition of two new faculty members: **John Graff**, an occupational epidemiologist is very interested in studying why some groups develop cancer, and **Dr. James Skupski** (to start in January of 2003), will serve as both the Residency Director, and the Director of Clinical Operations. We are excited about the expertise that both bring to the Division.

Remaining faculty include **James Blessman, MD**, who serves as the Director of the Division, **Cathy Simpson, MD**, who serves as the Coordinator of Research Activities,

Hikmet Jamil, MD, who was appointed this year to serve as the Associate Residency Director, and **Roger Wabeke**, a Certified Industrial Hygienist with teaching responsibilities. We are supported in our efforts by **Susan Williams**, Program Specialist, and **Stephanie Simpson** who assists with clinical operations. The Division remains active in three major domains: service, research, and education.

DOEM Service

James Blessman, MD, serves as the Medical Director to the City of Detroit employees. With nearly 18,000 full-time employees, Detroit is one of the largest employers in southeast Michigan and one of the largest local-government entities in the country. Between its police force, fire fighters and other municipal employees, the city has between 800 and 1,200 ongoing workers' compensation cases at any given time.

In addition to providing a safer work environment for city employees, Dr. Blessman estimates that he and his colleagues have saved the city more than \$15 million. One of his first accomplishments as medical director was to create a database that allowed the city to track its more than 45,000 workers' compensation claims. "It allowed the city to do all kinds of things they couldn't do before," Dr. Blessman said. "Now, they can track each incident, generate reports for themselves and see where the recurring problems were."

Service was also provided by **Cathy Simpson, MD**, who has directed the Sinai-Grace Hospital employee health service for the past 5 years. The Division also operates an Occupational Disease clinic that performs evaluations for local area businesses. These exams emphasize surveillance, attempting to identify the presence of work-related conditions at an early stage to lessen the impact of illness, or the evaluation of patients with the concern for a work-related condition where the question is causality, or whether workers are fit to perform their job.

Our scholarly efforts have emphasized wellness, issues relevant to physical activity, and occupational health issues facing Iraqi immigrants. Projects of note include: 1) Women on the Move, an effort to increase levels of physical activity in women, 2) a study of the relationship between physical activity and learning in children; and 3) a pilot study to assess the amount of physical activity performed by police officers involved in bike patrol.

Graduate Medical Education

In January 1998, the American College of Occupational and Environmental Medicine (ACOEM), the nation's largest medical society dedicated to promoting environmental and occupational health issues, defined a list of professional competencies for its 6,000 member physicians. The purpose of this list, was "to clarify the identity of the field of occupational and environmental medicine (OEM) in the face of a rapidly changing medical model and to enhance the understanding of what an OEM physician does and what an OEM physician has to offer society."

Among the first in the world to develop such competencies for their own residents, faculty members in the Wayne State University Department of Family Medicine played an important role in the development of the ACOEM guidelines. These OEM competencies are made explicit in a "learning contract," a written agreement negotiated between the resident, program director and off-site placement faculty that summarizes the specific competencies that are to be mastered at a given training site. The learning contract allows students, preceptors, and our residency program director to know exactly what is expected of the resident. It also clarifies the teacher's responsibility to arrange the learning environment so as to insure that the designated competencies can be mastered.

OEM Rotation

We continue to offer a successful OEM rotation introducing other primary care residents in our OHEP-affiliated programs to occupational health concepts. The one-month rotation is

offered quarterly and approximately 50 residents have received such training this year. **Dr. Jamil** directs this vital GME program that is highly recommended by residents.

The Department of Family Medicine residency in occupational medicine continues to mature. Residents graduating in 2002 were **Dr. Padmaja Morisetty, Dr. Noori Ibrahim, and Dr. Nadeem Siddqui**. All have secured jobs in Michigan and are making valued contributions to their respective organizations; congratulations to them all.

Current residents include **Dr. Shazhad Jahromi, Dr. Jayant Eldukar, Dr. Ifeyinwa Ilechukwu, and Dr. Stephen Shaya**. They are a very energetic group and continue to contribute to a stimulating learning environment. We are, of course, indebted to the greater than 20 voluntary faculty who make a very valued contribution to education of the residents. Special kudos go to **Roger Wabeke CIH**, who received this year's Teacher of the Year award.

We have a tremendous gratitude to the Residency Advisory Committee that is chaired by **Robert Morris, MD**. This committee had two new members in 2002: UAW Assistant Director **Dr. Thomas Weekly** and **Brooks Bock, MD, Chair**, WSU Department of Emergency Medicine. Thanks to all for your committed service.

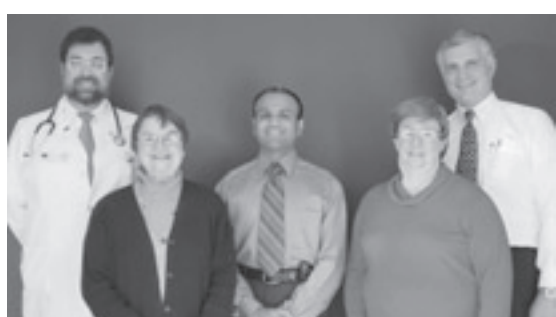
